Pupil Premium Report

The pupil premium is funding allocated to schools to boost the attainment of pupils from low-income families. Funding is based on children registered for a free school meal and children who have been in care for more than 6 months. The government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to the main funding the school receives, is the best way to address the inequalities between children on free school meals and other children.

Whilst schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit we are required to publish information about how we have used it.

Nature of support & curriculum focus

At Cuckney C of E Primary we have a clear philosophy that we provide a varied and exciting curriculum for all pupils to access. All children take part in a range of historical workshops, poet or specialist visits to support topic work, off site day visits as well as residential visits. These visits are subsidised by school to give all pupils equal opportunity.

Targeted support for pupils not making expected progress has been provided in small groups or on a 1:1 basis. These groups are led by suitably trained and experienced Teaching Assistants. These groups have been partially funded through the pupil premium.
