

# Cuckney C of E Primary School

## Pupil Premium Report

The pupil premium is funding allocated to schools to boost the attainment of pupils from low-income families. Funding is based on children registered for a free school meal and children who have been in care for more than 6 months. The government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to the main funding the school receives, is the best way to address the inequalities between children on free school meals and other children.

Whilst schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit we are required to publish information about how we have used it.

### Nature of support & curriculum focus

At Cuckney C of E Primary we have a clear philosophy that we provide a varied and exciting curriculum for all pupils to access. All children take part in a range of historical workshops, poet or specialist visits to support topic work, off site day visits as well as residential visits. These visits are subsidised by school to give all pupils equal opportunity.

Targeted support for pupils not making expected progress has been provided in small groups or on a 1:1 basis. These groups are led by suitably trained and experienced Teaching Assistants. These groups have been partially funded through the pupil premium.

5 pupils eligible for PPG in Y6 (1 child = 20%) out of a cohort size of 18. 3 of these pupils transferred in to school less than a year before the SATs

Further details of spending -

Toe by toe –

A phonic based intervention program to accelerate progress in spelling

Hornet -

A 1:1 based reading program which aims to accelerate progress in reading, suitable for KS2 pupils

Plus one –

Maths intervention program suitable for KS1 pupils

The power of two –

Maths intervention program suitable for KS2 pupils

Rapid reading –

Focussed intervention groups working on reading activities to accelerate progress.

Rapid phonics –

A phonics intervention program suitable for Early Years and KS1 pupils

Rapid maths –

Maths intervention program suitable for KS1 & 2 pupils

TA booster groups -

Targeted support in reading and writing for Year 6 pupils to further accelerate progress by addressing any gaps in knowledge.

Breakfast club -

Funded places are available to all pupils eligible for FSM

Holiday club -

Funded places are available to all pupils eligible for FSM

Subsidised day visits -

Places on school day visits funded by Pupil Premium

Subsidised residential trip -

Funded places are available to all pupils eligible for FSM

Music tuition & instrument hire -

FSM pupils are all encouraged to learn an instrument. These range from violin, to brass and even recorders.
