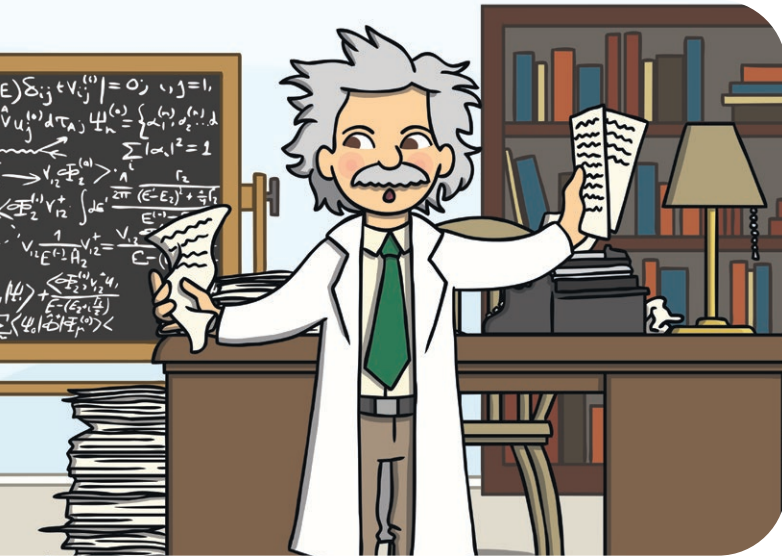




A Visit to Albert

Adult Guidance

Please find below the reading comprehension questions and some handy talking points for your class after the children have read the minibook. These are designed to be adult-led and encourage discussion either one-to-one, in a small group or with the whole class.

1. What did Albert need to complete his experiment?

Answer: Test tubes.

Follow-up questions:

- What are test tubes?
- Why do you think Albert needed them?
- What would you mix together in a test tube?

2. Albert's experiment made a big bang and fumes. What are fumes?

Answers might include: Gas. Smoke. A smell. Something in the air.

Discussion points:

- Can you always see fumes?
- Do you think fumes are a bad smell or could they be a good smell?
- Talk about fireworks - there is sometimes a bang and flash and you can smell the fumes.

3. Albert gave Kit and Sam some notes for the experiment. What do you think is important when you do an experiment?

Answers might include: Staying safe. Make a list of the things you need. Have a plan. Get some things to mix together. The children might list things they are going to mix.

Discussion points:

- How can you protect yourself when you are mixing things?
- Kit and Sam decided to do an experiment about time. What do you think they might have needed?
